

My dear Friends,

Glory to Jesus Christ!

Blessed Sunday to all of you and your loved ones! I trust that my message found everyone well and sound and that you have been enjoying the autumn.

On Wednesday, November 15th, we began the Nativity or Philip's Fast (Pylypivka)) that will last till Christmas Eve (please read in this bulletin the fasting and abstinence regulations that I put together). Moreover, at our eparchy's website, there are also some resources available for the families that could be used during the fast: https://stjosaphateparchy.com/st-philips-fast-for-families-week-by-week-activities/?mc_cid=008f88ef39&mc_eid=d5728b89c0. With that, I wish everyone a very blessed and spiritually fruitful Pylypivka with the hope that this year's fast will not be for you a pure formality, but the time to prepare yourselves worthily for the celebration of the Nativity of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Today we observe the seventh **World Day of the Poor**. Let us always be mindful of all people in the world who have less than we do, constantly aiding them with our prayers and charitable acts!

This year Holy Trinity Church in Youngstown celebrates its 112th anniversary. It "was officially incorporated in the State of Ohio on January 17, 1911" and the "cornerstone of the church edifice was laid and it was officially blessed by Bishop Ortynsky on November 12, 1911" with the parish having come into existence a few years or so earlier, namely in 1909 (see pages 29-30 of Holy Trinity Church's 100th Anniversary Book (2011)). On such a notable occasion, it behooves me to express, on behalf of all of the parishioners of Holy Trinity Church and myself, my deep gratefulness to our Lord for the over-centennial existence of our parish community, for all of His richly bestowed graces during all of those years. Despite that our community is getting smaller, let us not lose hope, but rather entrust ourselves completely to our Lord's Providence, surrendering ourselves to His most holy will and confidently moving forward. Our Lord is with us and He is the One Who leads us, His Church, on the path of holiness towards His Eternal Kingdom. May the Most Holy Theotokos and all the Holy Angels and Saints continue to be with us! As we like to sing in our Church, God is with us! 3 нами Бог! Нарру Anniversary, Holy Trinity Church! We are celebrating this coming Thursday, **November 23**rd here in the United States the **Thanksgiving Day**. In anticipation of this wonderful holiday, I am going to have **a Divine Liturgy of Thanksgiving to our Lord** for all the graces that He bestows daily on all of us living here in America and all Americans residing abroad tomorrow, **November 20**th **at 6:00 pm at St. Anne Church – vigil of the feast of the Entrance into the Temple of the Most Holy Theotokos**. Wishing everyone a wonderful Thanksgiving!

On Tuesday, **November 21st Ukraine observes the Day of Dignity and Freedom**. May our Lord continue to bless our beloved Ukraine and help to end the war there soon!

Every fourth Saturday of November, which this year falls on **November 25th**, Ukraine observes the **Day of Remembrance of the Victims of the Holodomors** [i.e., deaths by artificial starvation] in the country. Joining ourselves spiritually with our brothers and sisters in Ukraine, I will have the **Sunday morning's Divine Liturgy on November 26th at St. Anne Church for the victims of all Holodomors in Ukraine**. Moreover, let us pray to our All-merciful Triune Lord as well as do whatever is in our powers that no human person on earth may ever die from artificial or any starvation at all! May our Lord have mercy on the entire world!

Very sadly, the majority (at least, that's what we've been informed of) of those, who voted in Ohio, voted recently to include abortion in the State's Constitution. Of course, despite what the pro-choice supporters are saying, this is not a victory for the State of Ohio at all, but rather a huge abomination, especially in the eyes of our Lord Himself from Whom our life stems. There is nothing to celebrate here, but, on the contrary, to deplore this horrendous moral evil of murdering the innocent! Yet, this won't stop us to continue our pro-life and pro-God fight — truly, the fight against Satan himself and his servants! May our Lord have mercy on the people, who voted in favor of this hideous evil having endangered thereby their eternity, enlighten their hearts and minds, and save them from eternal perdition! Consequently, let us unite in prayer and action, reaffirming our firm YES TO LIFE and NO TO DEATH so that there will be no abortions not only here in Ohio but in every other part of the world! IF OUR LORD IS WITH US, WHO COULD BE AGAINST US (cf. Romans 8:31)?! Thank you very much! Please read the statement of the Ohio Catholic Bishops in regard to this matter that we publish in the bulletin. It is also quite sad that cannabis (recreational marijuana) was legalized in Ohio due to recent voting, which only open up more ways to the damage of man's body and soul; hence, we likewise need to pray and act to stop it. Speaking of the respect for life, I urge you to contact your Ohio Senator and Representative and ask them to act in favor of the abolishment of the death penalty in our State. Most importantly, I urge you to pray and act that the death penalty is abolished not only here in Ohio but in every other part of the world. Thank you very much! Sadly, the situation in our beloved Ukraine continues to remain grave. The country is still under a heavy attack from the side of Russia and whoever else sides with it in this horrible war... So many victims, including innocent children... How much longer will this bloodshed last? Right now, the People of Ukraine are being crucified... in fact, it is Christ Himself Who is being crucified again... Yet, life does not end with death! After the crucifixion and death comes resurrection! The resurrection will come for Ukraine as well! Today our risen Lord is embracing all people, who grieve due to having lost their loved ones because of the war in Ukraine, asking them to have faith in Him and not be afraid, for one day they will see their loved ones again, as this is a temporary absence. Today Jesus is telling the whole world just as He addressed His beloved friend Lazarus' sister Martha before Christ brought Lazarus back to life: "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" (John 11:25-26 (NRSVCE)). Lord Jesus, we believe in You, give us life eternal!

In the meantime, let us continue to *pray and act* for the end of Russia's war against Ukraine as well as for the conversion of Ukraine's aggressors and, as a Ukrainian citizen, I'd like to tell all of you: THANK YOU FOR YOUR SUPPORT OF OUR SUFFERING BROTHERS AND SISTERS IN UKRAINE! Ukraine direly needs our help right now! If you would like to help financially your brothers and sisters in Ukraine, please see a separate notice in the bulletin of how you can help. No amount is too small, yet please be generous, and I thank you in advance for your munificence! May our Good Lord reward you abundantly for it in this life and in the life to come!

Let us likewise pray and act for peace in the Middle East, particularly in the Holy Land, keeping also in our prayers those who were killed and died during the past and current wars and conflicts there.



NOTE ON HOLY SACRAMENTS OF THE EUCHARIST & RECONCILIATION (CONFESSION)

Generally, Catholics (and some non-Catholics under certain conditions) receive Holy Communion worthily if they do not have even one mortal sin on his/her soul (one sins mortally when all of the following three conditions are present: grave matter (10 Commandments), full knowledge, and deliberate consent), and, usually, these are people who go to confession more or less frequently; one is permitted to receive Holy Communion with the venial sins on his/her soul. Otherwise, if one receives Holy Communion unworthily, namely with mortal sin(s) on his/her soul and is aware of it, committing it with deliberate consent, one commits another mortal sin. Although, certainly, it is possible to live one's life without committing even one mortal sin for a long time and, hence, have no need for confession for a long time, such people could be considered exceptions. Also, in accordance with the Church Commandments (also known as the Church Precepts), a minimal requirement is for a person to go to confession at least once a year as well as to receive Holy Communion at least during the Easter season: to go to confession provided one committed at least one mortal sin and to receive Holy Communion provided one did not commit even one mortal sin.

SAINT PHILIP'S FAST PASTORAL OF THE UKRAINIAN CATHOLIC HIERARCHY IN THE US

"Behold, I am about to do something new! Now it already springs forth; do you not see it? (Is. 43:19)

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

We are commencing the Fast of St. Philip, embarking on a journey that culminates in the contemplation of an indescribable mystery – God's condescension to humanity. It is at the Nativity of Our Lord that God draws near to us, for "In the union of the divine and human, 'the incorporeal one takes on flesh, the Word becomes approachable, the invisible one is seen, the impalpable one is touched, the one beyond time enters time, the Son of God becomes the Son of Man." (Christ Our Pascha, §179). In this divine event, God not only reveals His name but also makes Himself visible, inviting us to recognize Him.

For the second consecutive year, we, Ukrainians in the US, find ourselves preparing for Christmas amidst a full-scale war with the Russian aggressor. Our Ukrainian soil is soaked in the blood of heroes, and our cities and villages under occupation are shrouded under the black pall of the "Russian world." We continually pose questions to each other and to God: "How much longer will this endure? Why, O God, does this war persist?"

Let us consider the circumstances in which our Lord came to the world. Humanity, perpetually anxious and born in fear, anticipated the coming of the Messiah, each person harboring their own expectations of His identity. Who among them recognized Him as the "something new [that] springs forth," as prophesied by the Prophet Isaiah? (Is. 43:19) The initial witnesses to the choir of angels were humble shepherds, for "Many are the high and exalted, but God reveals his mysteries to the humble." (Sir. 3:19)

Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God (Matt. 5:8). Pure in heart shepherds became the symbol of those who were capable to see God. However, the path to purity of heart is arduous, demanding profound introspection. We often find ourselves dissatisfied with our circumstances. This war, while manifestly physical and visible, also has deep spiritual ramifications. We yearn for change, for someone to rise against injustice and corruption, yet we tend to overlook that the journey begins within ourselves, with our heart.

"Behold, now is the acceptable time; behold, now is the day of salvation." (2 Cor. 6:2) The day of salvation marks the inception of our inner journey. The Apostle Paul calls us to bear witness, to be people of hope who endure "in steadfast perseverance; in afflictions, hardships, and distress." As we embark on the path to the Nativity, we strive to "open wide our hearts" (2 Cor. 6:13).

The time is opportune for us to begin. Our first task is the transformation of our hearts. When we delve into the lives of the saints, we often marvel at how they found spiritual equilibrium amidst sorrow, mastering themselves and receiving the strength of Christ, "who by faith conquered kingdoms, administered justice, and obtained promises. They closed the mouths of lions, quenched raging fires, and escaped the edge of the sword. Their weakness was turned into strength..." (Heb. 11:33-34) Today, our front-line defenders demonstrate that heroes are not born but are instead forged through daily toil and self-sacrifice, proving their unwavering commitment to our homeland.

As we commence this journey to the Nativity, we invite you to fathom the depths of this mystery. A single child altered the course of human history with His birth. The tapestry of human history is interwoven with the thread of Jesus Christ. We are also capable and called to change our personal stories and big history. When we gather in the Name of Jesus Christ, each one of us can contribute with the gifts bestowed upon us by the Lord, thereby effecting change in the world around us.

The venerable Metropolitan Andrey Sheptytsky, in his address to the faithful on Christmas Day 1942, amidst the tumult of the Second World War, exhorted us to struggle: "Those who, with Christ, have battled the passions that lead to sin within their own hearts, who have tasted the power of Christ in victories over themselves, do not merely believe in Christ's victory but know it from personal experience... the cause of our sorrow will pass, and the day of joy will dawn."

Dear brothers and sisters, during this Nativity fast, we urge you to engage in intentional spiritual exercises aimed at

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overcoming sin in your lives, leading you into the battle for the purity of your hearts. As Jesus teaches, "For from the heart come evil thoughts, murder, adultery, fornication, theft, perjury, slander." (Matt. 15:19)

Much work lies ahead, but it is the sole path to a genuine experience of the Nativity of Our Lord. We are called to comprehend the gift of patience, for in God's timing, everything unfolds according to His divine plan. While we may ardently desire swift change and accomplishment, true transformation occurs when we cooperate with God's grace, serving our neighbors with fervor "in afflictions, hardships, and distress." Thus, we become like those who are "sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; poor, yet making many rich; having nothing, yet possessing everything." (2 Cor. 6:4-10)

At the liturgical prayers of the Feast of the Nativity, the Church proclaims, "For the Father's express Image, the Imprint of His eternity, takes the form of a servant, and without undergoing change He comes forth from a Mother who knew not wedlock. Third, we need friends and community who will help sustain us and help us find meaning in life.

Today, I ask you to stretch beyond yourself to help the Eparchy of Saint Josaphat, so that we can continue to serve others both here and abroad. In the 11 states of the Eparchy, we are growing parishes, teaching values to young people, and welcoming war refugees. FASTING & ABSTINENCE REGULATIONS FOR THE UKRAINIAN CATHOLIC CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

In accordance with statute 403 of *The Statutes of the Ukrainian Catholic Eparchy of St. Josaphat in Parma*, "As each Christian is called to ongoing repentance and amendment of life, the ancient practice of fasting is to be maintained. All those from 14 to 59 years of age, inclusively, must abstain from meat on Holy Saturday and each and every Friday of Lent (the Great Fast), as well as Christmas Eve, December 24 and Theophany Eve, January 5. These faithful must also abstain from meat and all dairy food (including milk, eggs, cheese, etc.) on the first day of the Great Fast (the Monday which follows Cheesefare Sunday) and on Holy and Great Friday. Pregnant and nursing mothers, the ill and infirm, those who work at hard physical labor and the very poor are excused" (statute 403, *The Statutes of the Ukrainian Catholic Eparchy of St. Josaphat in Parma*, 19 August 1994). The statute continues: "The eparch can dispense all the faithful of the eparchy as well as any individuals for a good reason from any of these fasting prescriptions. A pastor may also dispense individual parishioners for a good reason. He cannot, however, dispense the entire parish" (ibid.). Moreover, according the article 472 of the 1999 *Pastoral Guide of the Ukrainian Catholic Church in the United States of America* (the guide that "supplements [and does not contradict] the Statutes of the Eparchy of St. Josaphat in Parma" in our eparchy (see article 4 of the *Pastoral Guide*); the guide's revised version is forthcoming), "[t]he periods of penitence and their respective duration are:

- Great Lent, extending from the Monday after Cheesefare Sunday to the Saturday of Lazarus. And Great and Holy Week, extending from Great Monday to Great and Holy Saturday inclusively.
- The preparation for the Birth of Jesus Christ in the Flesh (*Pylypivka*) begins on the day..." after "... the feast of St. Philip (November 15), and lasts until the Eve of the Nativity of Christ (December 24) inclusively.
- The Apostles' Fast ([P]etrivka) extends from the Monday following the Sunday of All Saints, and continues through to the day preceding the Feast of SS. Peter and Paul (June 28), inclusively.
- The Dormition Fast (*Spasivka*) begins on August [1] and lasts until the eve of the Dormition of the Blessed Virgin Mary (August 14), inclusively" (article 472, *Pastoral Guide of the Ukrainian Catholic Church in the United States of America* (Philadelphia, PA, 1999)).

Furthermore, the "[g]eneral rules governing abstinence [are]:

- Meat is to be understood as including not only the flesh but also those parts of warm-blooded animals that cannot be melted down, e.g., the liver, lungs, blood, graves, etc. Although it is not the authentic practice of the Tradition[,] the meat of fish and crustaceans may be eaten, as well of those mammals, that live constantly in water, as, e.g., whales.
- Dairy Products are to be understood as comprising products derived from mammals and birds, but not regarded as meat, e.g., cheese, lard, butter, milk, and its by-products, eggs, etc.
- Fats of plant origin, e.g., those derived from olives, coconuts, seeds of the sunflower and of the pumpkin, may be used.
- Voluntary penance, prayers for the intentions of the hierarchs of the Church, Bishop of Rome, the Major Archbishop, the Metropolitan, and the Eparchial Bishop; voluntary offerings to the Church, the seminaries, the Church in Ukraine, self-denial of alcohol,
 smoking, attendance at entertainment, etc., may be supplementary only with permission of a confessor. Bread and water alone
 [are] a good fast.
- Priests who possess a pastoral assignment are empowered to grant dispensations or relaxation from the laws of abstinence to individual persons as well as to individual families.
- The following are exempt from abstinence:
 - (1) the poor who live on alms; (2) sick and frail persons;
 - (3) convalescents who are returning to their strength; (4) pregnant women, and mothers who are nursing their children;
 - (5) persons who perform hard labor;
 - (6) children who have not completed their seventh [currently, fourteenth] year of age;
 - (7) [p]ersons have completed their 59th year of age" with permission of their pastor or confessor" [the clause "with permission of their pastor or confessor" is no longer valid... it could have been an original error, too...]

(article 474, Pastoral Guide of the Ukrainian Catholic Church in the United States of America (Philadelphia, PA, 1999)).

Furthermore, in accordance with article 475 of the *Pastoral Guide*, "In virtue of rules enacted by the Synod of Bishops under the presidency of the Major Archbishop in 1969 the following rules of abstinence oblige in the United States:

- Abstinence from meat on all Fridays of the year except those which occur in privileged weeks and on holydays of Our Lord and of the Mother of God.
- Abstinence from meat and all dairy products on the first day of the Great Fast (Lent) and on Good Friday.
- Abstinence from meat, in addition to eating only one full meal and a smaller snack, milk products being permitted in accordance
 with local custom: on Christmas Eve, Epiphany Eve, Exaltation of the Holy Cross (September 14) and Beheading of St. John the
 Baptist (August 29).
- During the Great Fast, the faithful may also maintain the tradition of abstaining from meat on Wednesdays" (ibid., article 475). Compiled by Fr. Lubomir Zhybak on March 3, 2022 and revised on July 21, 2023.
